Peter's bands

My long-standing (teenage) interest in playing music was rekindled back in 2009 when an AA work colleague (detecting musical interest in our team of 30 people) suggested a musical get-together at the local rehearsal studio, and 10 of us joined in the inaugural fun session.

That became a regular monthly event (with a varying line up) which I looked forward to without fail for the next 6 years, and we made some (mostly) great sounds together. I started off playing guitar and keyboard but ended up playing and preferring bass guitar. It was a great feeling if we tried a new song and everything fell into place first time. We played two charity gigs at the Pure / Plush lounge bar under the name of JAAM, and they were both sold out!

All good things come to an end - the team was dispersed, with half of them being relocated to London. And yet another reorganisation meant my leaving the AA, with time on my hands. Rather than looking for more employment, I decided to concentrate on what I loved - playing music!



Over the next few years, I found myself playing in various bands, of different

musical abilities. Live gigs varied from Four Lanes Junior and Infant School Summer Fete to the Bakers Arms in Winchester. The closest to experiencing the 'wow' factor of the JAAM was when I assembled a group of 6 (all AA ex-colleagues) for a charity 60s - 70s music night at Viables, under the name JAMTRAP. Despite the success of that night, for various reasons, it was only ever likely to be a one-off gig for JAMTRAP.

I thought I'd found my ideal band with Upraw - we were a friendly bunch, doing music I liked, and with a great lady singer. We played at parties, pubs, inside and outside, and we played New Year's Eve 2019 at the Row Barge, Woolhampton to a very enthusiastic audience. But along came COVID, and a year of enforced practising solo. Other band members were also having issues regarding jobs (or lack of!) so all that more or less finished off the band.

Still, like buses, another one came along. This one had a very professional web site, and they rehearsed in a grand country house, which had a band practice area with a permanent drum kit set up. I was very nervous at the audition – until I discovered that they were more out of practice than I was, and I got the job! But we disbanded 3 months later without ever performing a gig!

After that it was 'bits and pieces' for a while. With 'new' bands, I did a couple of one-off charity fund-raising gigs (Dogmersfield fete, and Waterlooville Community centre) and deputised a couple of times for an old band.

I even played a gig on a cruise ship – it was a private party on the John Pinkerton on the Basingstoke canal! Yes, we did manage to get our drum kit and all our equipment on board without sinking it!

Then – tired of waiting for the right opportunity – I decided to start my own band, based on my love of Beatles music. I was swamped with applicants! The 'Hey Judicators' has been going for about a year now, and have a second appearance pencilled in at the Railway Club on October 5th, and a date to be confirmed at the Irish Centre.



But I still had some time on my hands. When the established (Farnham-based) band the Beat Tones

asked me to join them, I seized the opportunity, and have enjoyed performing 60s and 70s numbers (including many Beatles and Stones favourites) at parties at Frensham Sailing Club, Farnham Golf Club, and at a pub here and there.

So now, when filling in a form that requires me to state my occupation, I state 'Musician' rather than 'Retired' even though my net earnings (after studio hire and travel expenses etc.) are negative!

Having said that, I and fellow band members will generally play for free (or just for expenses) for charity events, which are generally good fun.

If you want to celebrate a special occasion, and you fancy some live music, please get in touch. For private parties, yes of course it's more expensive than hiring a DJ, but live music is a bit special – isn't it?

A Member's Cheesecake you can Eat!

And not feel guilty about how many calories you are consuming!



Carol Sim, a recently joined member of our u3a and Slimming World, who loves to cook has been working on how to make a low calorie or in Slimming Worlds terms, less syns cheesecake. I love my puddings so this is great news and as you can see not too difficult to make yourself.

MIXED BERRY CHEESECAKE SERVES 6

INGREDIENTS:

450g FAT FREE COTTAGE CHEESE

RASPBERRY SHORTCAKE ALPEN LIGHT BARS.

50g I CAN'T BELIEVE IT'S NOT BUTTER LIGHT

2 X HARTLEYS SUGAR FREE JELLY CRYSTALS

300g MIXED BERRIES



METHOD

Blitz the cereal bars until broken down, giving a coarse crumb. Melt the butter, mix into the crumb base, and press into a 8"/20cm lined loose bottom cake tin, or pie dish. Press down with a spoon to make it firm and level, and refrigerate whilst you prepare the topping.

Melt both jelly sachets in 100ml boiling water. Stir until completely dissolved, and leave to cool. (quicker in the fridge or freezer, if you make sure it doesn't set.)

Put the Cottage Cheese & cooled jelly into a blender, and blitz until completely smooth – it takes about 3 minutes to get rid of the cottage cheese texture.

Chop about half the berries into smallish small pieces, and spread them out on the base.

Pour the topping over the base in the tin, make a slight dip in the middle for the remaining berries and refrigerate until set – approx.1 - 2hrs.

Remove from the tin, and decorate with the berries.


